

## Annual Celebration To Kick Off Today

Americana is about to unfold! Today and tomorrow eager Bards will catch glimpses of the "American Scene" as the 1958 Homecoming festivities reign over the hilltop.

Plans will merge into realities this afternoon when the school is dismissed at 2:15 p.m. for the pep convo in the auditorium. Emcee Mike Campbell, senior, will introduce the speakers, Mr. Max E. Thomas, president of the Glenbard Boosters, and Coaches C.A.R. Johnson, cross country; Warren Wiltzie, frosh sophs; and Liz Astroth, varsity.

In the role of "Uncle Sam," Superintendent Fred L. Blester will introduce the homecoming court and reveal the identity of "Miss America."

Having hardly a moment to breathe, enthusiastic Bards will form the annual torchlight parade at the corner of Glenwood and Pennsylvania Avenues at 7:15 p.m. Making its way to Main, south to Crescent, and east on Crescent to Ellyn, it will move down the hill to the football field to touch off the bonfire.

As the massive blaze illuminates the field, senior Tom Chandler will officially begin the pep rally, the highlight of the evening. Speakers will be Mr. Don Smith, varsity line coach, and varsity co-captains Bruce Spencer and Terry Thomas. The queen and her court will again be introduced, after which the snake dance, with the cheerleaders as guides, will wind a trail for you.

Ardent workers of the past few weeks will be rewarded Saturday morning as their floats are on display in the Homecoming parade. At 9 a.m., the parade of over 40 entires will form at the corner of Main and Hill in Glen Ellyn. Moving through downtown Glen Ellyn to Lombard, the procession will pass through the Lombard business district at approximately 10 a.m.

Highlighting the afternoon activities will be the frosh-soph and varsity games with Lyons. After the frosh-soph game, the Glen Ellyn Grade School Bands will perform under the direction of Mr. W. C. Edwards. At the varsity game halftime, the Glenbard band, directed by Mr. George C. Wall and led by drum major Jim Farris, junior, will present a football show.

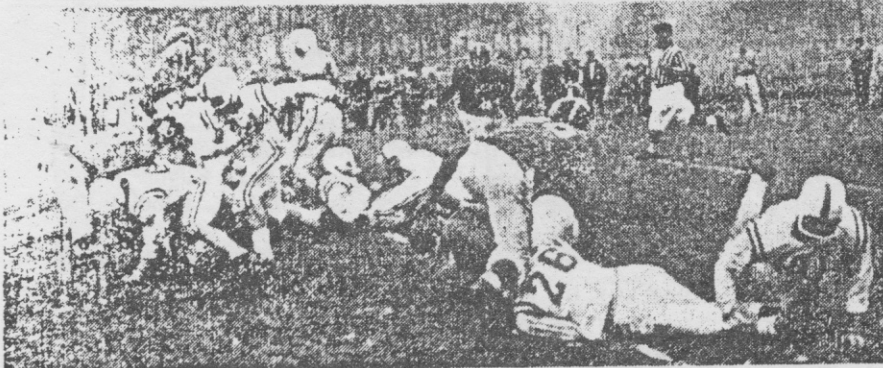

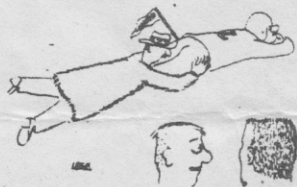

## League Leaders Pile Up 53-0 Count On Hilltoppers

It was a great day for Chuck Johnson, as Lyons of LaGrange copped the Glenbard Homecoming game, 53-0, at Lake Ellyn last Saturday afternoon.

Johnson contributed 195 yards rushing out of the Lyons total of 411, and 42 yards on a pass play out of the Lyons' 108. The husky left halfback made five runs in double figures for 61 yards, 49 yards, 42 yards and 16 yards. He added three more under 10 yards.

Lyons scored in every quarter, with a double counter in the first and third quarters, and a triple in the fourth.

**Order Of The Day**  
Long touchdown drives by Lyons were the order of the day. They scored on drives of 80 yards, 75, 73, 70, 55, 43, and 25. Another score stemmed from a Topper fumble on their 18 yard line.

The visitors made 18 first downs to eight for the Toppers. They passed 14 times, completing seven for 108 yards with seven incomplete. Glenbard passed four times, completing one for five yards, with three incomplete.

Lyons totalled 537 yards in total advancement of the ball (18 on returned kicks, 411 rushing and 108 passing. Glenbard totalled 253 yards advancement (86 on returned kicks, 132 rushing, 30 on penalties and five on passes).

**Four Glenbard Fumbles**  
Glenbard fumbled four times, losing the ball each time. Lyons fumbled once, Bruce Beiner and Glen Bretsnyder recovering for the home team.

Lyons was penalized 60 yards on four 15 yard penalties; Glenbard was penalized 30 yards.

In the play of the game, Lyons received the opening kickoff and drove 80 yards for its first touchdown in a minute and a half. Johnson climaxing the drive with a 49 yard run around his right end with Ron Chandler kicking the point.

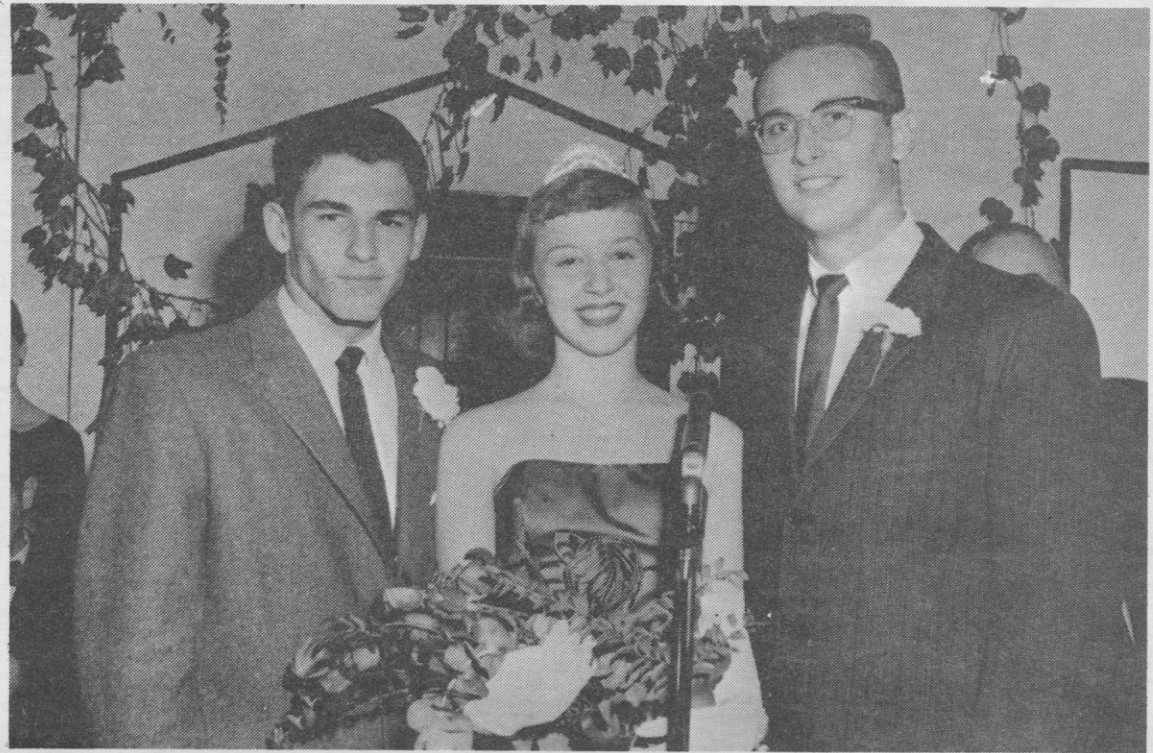

## Doug Walter Finishes Second In State Tournament

### Sports Profile

"Although some of our runners are habitually fallinto the lake, the '58 squad seems to be a lot sharper than last year's," stated John Staedke, senior ace of the Johnsonmen.

In his three years on the harrier squad, John's contributions have been invaluable because of his persistent loyalty to the team. In his sophomore year, John kept trying to improve until he won a meet late in the season. In his two years on varsity, John has been a continual threat, to his opponents, always managing to finish within the first five places.

John maintains he went out for cross country because he had always liked to run, "not fast, just run."

John's most remembered meet was this year's Bloom Invitational in which he placed sixteenth in a field of 126 runners from all over Chicagoland.

"We ran most of the meet in the rain, but it was great anyway."

In the spring, John gets his spikes down again for the track season, with long-distance running a must for him.

"Running the mile and half-mile have brought me a lot of satisfaction, even though I spent most of last year in the wake of the Tichy brothers," he recalled.

After the track season last spring, John worked as a lifeguard at the Lombard pool.

When he hangs up his spikes at Glenbard, John will attend college somewhere in the Midwest. At college, he plans to be a "real plugger" for cross country.

### Sports Profile

Tom Henry, Glenbard's ace quarter-miler, began his sports career as a freshman by winning his numerals in cross country and track and by going out for basketball.

The next year, because of an eye operation, Tom did not participate in sports until spring when he went out for track. He went downstate with the mile relay team, which placed sixth, and earned his first letter.

Sticking with track throughout high school, Tom lettered in both his junior and senior years. He began running the quarter-mile as a soph, and has continued with the quarter, an occasional mile, and an 880- or 440-yard relay. Tom was also on the 440-yard relay team that broke the record at the Hinsdale Relays.

Undeafed in outdoor competition, Tom has won firsts in the Little Four, Ottawa, County, and District track meets, as well as in all the less important dual meets of the season. He also placed fourth in the quarter-mile on the State Athletic Honor Roll compiled by the Champaign News-Gazette. He names as his greatest accomplishment in sports winning the quarter-mile in the District Meet this year.

Concerning the Glenbard athletic program, Tom states, "It is better this year than ever before because of the addition of various new sports that enable more boys to participate."

A possible improvement in Glenbard sports, in Tom's opinion, would be to "make all sports intramural as well as interscholastic, provided there is enough student interest."

Hoping to get an athletic scholarship in track, Tom will attend Bradley University in Peoria next year, where he will major in architecture, and, of course, run the 440.

## Frosh Hardballers Chalk Up 10 Wins

Ending a highly successful season with a 10-win, 2-loss, and 1-tie record, the frosh diamondmen established the best record of Glenbard's three baseball teams.

Winning six out of seven games during April, with the seventh a tie, the frosh began May with hopes of an undefeated season. They triumphed over Hinsdale, 9-7, May 5, but their hopes were crushed the next day when they were defeated, 9-5, at LaGrange.

During the next seven days, the freshmen defeated Downers Grove, 12-7, May 8; West Proviso, 3-1, May 12; lost to Joliet, 3-2, May 14; and to end the season on a happy note, outslugged Downers Grove, 14-10, Friday, May 15.

Coach Richard Kamm credits the victorious season to overall team balance and to the pitching of Dave Mueller and Tom Moeller. Outstanding hitters during the year were Tom Hancock, Moeller, Muller, David Palmer, and Dave Smith.

To reach the finals, Walter defeated Jim Bimes, Greenville, 6-1, 6-0; Larry Avery, Quincy, 6-0, 6-0; Hal Lowe, Decatur McArthur, 6-0, 6-0; and semi-finalist Gary Baxter, Lake View, 6-4, 8-6.

Walter has won every match in the past two years except those against Riessen, while Riessen has not lost a match or set in three years of play.

Led by Walter, the varsity netmen won two of their last three dual meets. They topped Maine, 3-2, Tuesday, May 5; defeated Riverside, 3-2, Thursday, May 7; and bowed to Arlington, 3-2, May 12. In the three meets, Walter scored a total of three, Paul Kummer two, and Bob Brunk one in singles competition. The doubles team of Tom Chandler and Jim Paul scored two wins.

The tennis squad placed fifth in the W.S.C. Tournament held Tuesday and Wednesday, May 19 and 20.

The frosh-soph squad defeated Riverside, 3-2, and lost to Maine, 4-1, and Arlington, 3-2.

## Golf Squad Announces Awards and Lettermen

Honors in golf this year go to "Most Valuable Player," Leon McNair, and Bill Bert, whose 78 provided the season's lowest score.

Other golfers receiving their varsity letters were Dave McCollum, Doug Murray, Sy Nelson, and Larry Yud.

In the District Meet on May 8, the Bards came in seventh of the 15 schools. Sophomore Bob Anderson shot the best round for Glenbard with a 79.

Bouncing back on May 14, the Brads trounced R-B, 12 1/2-2 1/2. The varsity then defeated Lyons, 9 1/2-5 1/2. Juniors Leon McNair and Sy Nelson posted 82's.

Coach George Haas stated that Arlington Heights has clinched the conference crown and that Glenbard will come either fourth or fifth. The standings are not yet definite because there are still a few matches to be played.

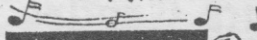
The frosh-soph squad tied with Hinsdale for second place in the conference tournament, coming in second to Downers. Bob Anderson paced the team with two scores of 79.

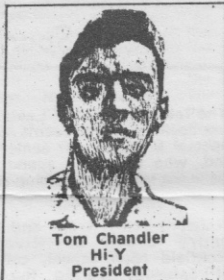

### Cliff Argue 'Scoops' Up News As Editor and Press Chief

Today's spotlihter worked as an office boy for an engineering company last summer and wound up editing a 16 page engineering magazine before the summer ended.

This experience is typical of Cliff Argue's activities, since journalism somehow slips into his every undertaking.

Cliff got his start in the journalism world as an eighth-grader in Dayton, Ohio.

"I hung around the journalism room so much that the advisor, who was also my homeroom teacher, let me be the only eighth-grader on the high school staff," Cliff related.

As a Glenbard freshman, Cliff managed the varsity track team with Harold Hoffman.

"On the way to the meet at Naperville, Harold and I discovered that a boy on the freshman relay team was missing. We flipped a coin to see who would get to run in his place. Luckily, I lost."

During his freshman year, Cliff phoned in the track results to the Daily Journal in Wheaton after every meet. The next year, he was asked to be a sports writer for the Journal.

Still managing the track team in his sophomore year, Cliff was persuaded to run the 100-yard dash against Frank Cavey in the last meet.

"Frank had said he would let me beat him, but whenever I came near him, he pulled away," Cliff remembered.

Reporting for the Journal during his sophomore and junior years involved many "interesting" experiences.

"One time, I was covering a football game at Arlington in the press box. During the first half, the lights and heat worked fine, but the second half we sat in the dark and shivered," Cliff said.

"Last year, I went with Ernie Duck of the Glen Ellyn News to cover the State Track Meet. Ernie kept insisting we didn't need hotel reservations. When we got there, we looked for an hour for a room in Champaign and ended up driving 50 miles to Danville. This year, against Ernie's advice, I made r reservations."

Last summer Cliff attended Boys' State with seven other Glenbard juniors. As one of the editors of a four-page daily paper, he worked all hours preparing copy for the next day's paper.

"One day I was running back to my county (dormitory) to vote in an election. Since I had been working on the paper all day, I didn't know that one-way streets had been designated.

"Naturally, I came speeding up a street the wrong way. I was caught and brought before the judge, who appeared to be Mike Campbell. He sentenced me to 25 pushups."

Cliff's most memorable moment at Glenbard occurred last year in the honors convo.

## In the Senior Spotlight

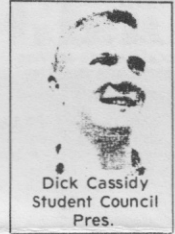
It's wonderful to win, but even better, to know that people want you enough to work for you," acknowledged Dick Cassidy, 1958-1959 Student Council president.

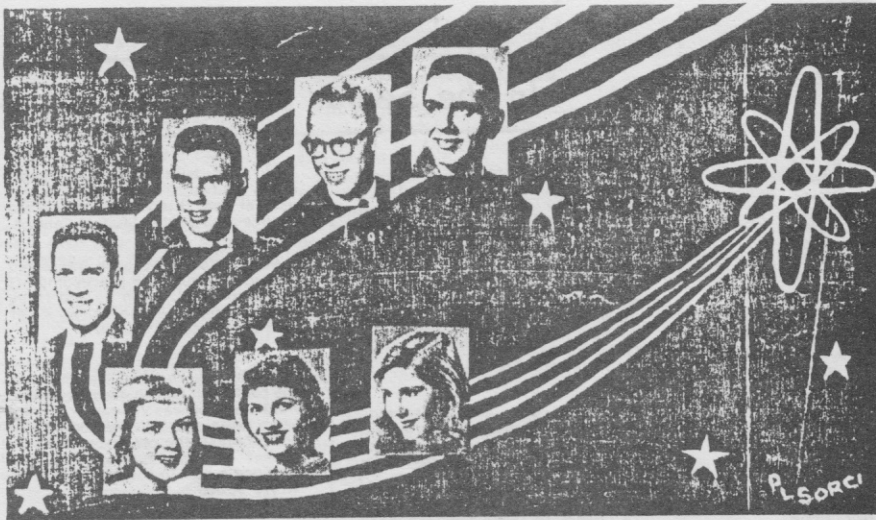
